Keys to the past

Ted Blatt has been collecting keys since 1976, when his sister **Dorothea** gave him a key as a joke, with the suggestion that he start collecting them. Dorothea's husband had collected keys.

That was many keys ago. To be exact, that was 29,516 keys ago! (as of June 22nd, 2004).

One of Ted's garages has a solid wall of keys on it—row after row of keys. The keys even follow the contours of the wall, from floor to ceiling. Having

used all the available space on that wall, Ted has had to continue the rows on an adjacent wall. He has tried several systems of cataloging his keys. At one time he used the alphabet to organize them—A to Z for automobiles. Subsequently, he tried to group his keys by category. But then his key collection had expanded to thousands and he didn't have room to keep the categories, so the organization went away, but the counting was kept accurate. As Ted phrased it, he is only interested in volume.

The collection contains keys from the United States and around the world. Ted has one key from Saudi Arabia. The key collection includes keys of all sorts—skeleton keys from old locks, car keys, house keys, clock keys, skate keys, tiny drawer and jewelry box keys, luggage lock keys, handcuff keys, and motel keys. The keys range in size from a half inch to about 6 or 8 inches. Ted has never paid for a key in his collection, they have all been gifts from friends. He says to pay for keys would take the challenge away. Sometimes Ted will come home to find that someone has left keys between his doors. He has some colored keys, and brass, iron, and aluminum keys. Ted's first goal was to have 100 keys, then 1,000 keys, followed by 10,000, 15,000,

and 20,000.

Ted keeps his keys "in a garage that is ready to fall down" from the weight. With 55 keys to a pound, Ted already has 536.65 pounds of keys.

Ted Blatt relates the story that years ago **Bill Lemley** wanted to go up into the widow's walk of the Kelleys Mansion, but there was a locked door barring access and he didn't have a key to open it. Someone suggested that with all the keys Ted had to choose from, he might have one that would open the door. So Lemley came to see Ted and Ted gave Lemley a handful of skeleton keys to try in the locked door. One of

them worked!

A couple of weeks ago fifteen students visited Ted's key collection. They thought it was fun, and they promised that when they returned home they would send him "keys" as a thank you. Ted once answered an advertisement about keys from a man in North Olmsted. Ted asked his nephew **Bill Koenigseker** to meet with that key collector and he came back with 3,000 more keys for Ted! Some of Ted's unusual keys are cash register keys that have a smiling face on them. Then there are the animal keys- remember those American cars named after animals- Cougar, Mustang, Firebird and a deer for John Deere. There are keys with crowns, from an insurance company, and Pontiac, the Indian and the car.

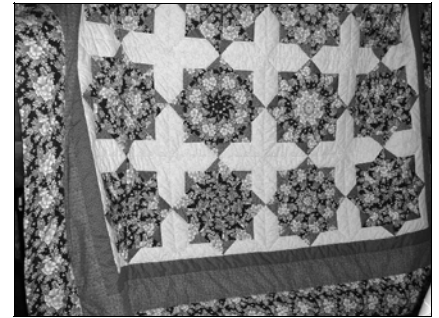
Ted's next goal is 30,000 keys in his Kelleys Island collection. Once a person starts collecting, it is hard to stop. Collecting keys is Ted Blatt's Kelleys Island hobby.

Not to be out done, Ted collects bottle openers at his Sandusky address. (Ted Blatt is a KIHA supporter and was born and raised on Kelleys Island.)

Welcome back potluck, chance to show new acquisitions

The June Welcome Back Potluck was held at St. Michael's Social Hall on June 3rd. We had a short meeting to vote on changes to the Constitution and By-Laws. All of the Board's proposed changes passed unanimously.

One of the biggest changes for members is that the membership year has been re-set to begin January 1st and end December 31st each year. This year, 2004, all memberships will run until December 31st, instead of the former year's end of July 31st. You will receive notices to renew your membership in December. Proxy ballots will be mailed a month before the Annual Meeting, which occurs in August. The governing body section of the Constitution has been changed to add that "Only one person from an immediate family residing in the same household shall serve on the Board." This had been an unwritten policy and now it has been placed into the Constitution. For emphasis, a previous version of the section under Officers and Board Members has been re-instated: "Officers should be elected from the Board of Directors except where no board member is able to fulfill the duties of the office."

Following the potluck, members were invited to look at recent donations to the Museum. We have received a donation of five shares in the **Kelley's**

Island Dock and Steam Boat Company from September 8th, 1947. The certificate was made to **Robert F. Hauser** and his son found it in a family Bible after his father's passing. He contacted us about donating it to the museum collection.

Bill and Terri Stevenson donated a metal box used to write continuous paper invoices at the Kelley's Island Dock and Steam Boat Company, which still has the company paper in it. **Russ Matso** has been collecting items and he has donated some written invoices from the company. You will find a lot of familiar names on them.

We also had the good fortune to be allowed to display some of the items

from the **Camp Patmos** box that was found in the sealed off attic of the Hamilton House (now Camp Patmos) during renovations last fall. Camp Patmos plans to donate some of the items to the Historical Assn. and to keep some of them. Final decisions have yet to be made on the disposition of the

pieces. The wooden box contains a few items like a painted, broken umbrella handle, a small bottle (perhaps for medicine), and other sundry items. Most of the contents were letters and newspaper clippings. The letters are mostly between family members and friends of Mr. **William H. Selfe** and Mr. **Robert Hamilton**, and occur between 1895 and 1898.

One wonders how such a collection of stuff got itself together and into the box. It seems like a collection of items you might find in a dresser or desk drawer. There are also many poems cut from newspapers, at least one political cartoon, and some patent medicine advertisements. The letters give some sense of the rhythm of life on Kelleys Island at the end of the 19th century, and many of the invoices and letters mention other Kelleys Island inhabitants. For the potluck some of the papers were inserted into archival sheet protectors so that members could handle them. The letters are hand written in pen or pencil and the paper is in good condition. We are looking forward to preparing more letters for handling and to make arrangements so that some of them can be displayed. Thank you to **Ed Miller** and other staff at Camp Patmos for thinking of the Kelleys Island Historical Assoc.

The potluck food was also great!

Memorial Day at Kelleys Island, Ohio

Summer is here once again. Memorial Day began the summer season this year just as it has for many years previous. In this time of uncertainty with American soldiers serving their country overseas, and in harm's way, it is thought-provoking to see the **1924 Memorial Day Program** with the Kelleys Island festivities to honor soldiers and sailors. It involved a boat trip on the Chippewa to Pelee Island and back, a parade in the evening from Estes School to the Cemetery, with appropriate speakers and songs, dedication of the New Park, with a Memorial Day address by the **Honorable W. E. Minshall**, ending with fireworks over the lake. Close your eyes and you can see and hear the passengers on the Chippewa singing "My Country 'Tis of Thee" when crossing the international boundary line, and watching as a delegation was strewing flowers on the lake in memory of sailors lost to the sea.

The parade to the cemetery included a Fife & Drum Corps, the Knights of St. John, the Red Cross Unit, Lady Maccabees, Madonna Auxiliary, Men Maccabees, and Grand Army of the Republic Veterans and Widows. What a day that must have been!

This schedule allows mothers of families ample time to get their youngsters ready and come to the exercises themselves. The work of the day will be over, and thus, with your daily cares laid aside, you can the better enter into the spirit of the occasion.

PROGRAM (last page)

Church bells will be tolled in memory of the soldier and sailor dead, during the naval tribute aboard the boat, as well as during the exercises at the cemetery and park.

Take the afternoon off and come with us on a pleasant boat ride to Pelee, the quaint Canadian Neighbor Isle, or try your luck with "the finny tribe" at Kelleys! Enjoy the blessings our heroes fought so nobly to preserve for us! Everybody welcome!
