William S. Webb family donates Civil War correspondence—

An ongoing series of the KIHA Newsletter

*Through the generosity of family members of **William S. Webb**, we were given transcripts of letters that Mr. Webb wrote to his family during his 100 days service in The Civil War. Since the Kelleys Island men left as a company from the island, they, initially at least, stayed together and thus Mr. Webb's letters sometimes include mention of other islanders who were also fighting. It is not often that a person has the opportunity to relive history.*

*William S. Webb was married to **Elizabeth Kelley** and three children—**Sarah, Isabelle** and **Charles**. In 1860, William S. Webb is listed on the Census as a stone mason earning \$8,000 a year.*

*William S. Webb went to war in 1864 and he wrote letters home to his family on Kelleys Island. Captain Webb's daughter Sarah copied his letters into a notebook. **William D. Webb** is the great-grandson of this Kelleys Island Civil War soldier and his grand-daughter, **Katia Duey**, transcribed the letters from the notebook. Katia Duey is currently attending Temple University. We sincerely thank the William D. Webb family for their interest in their own family history and that of Kelleys Island—and for the opportunity they have given the Kelleys Island Historical Association to share this wonderful story.*

*William S. Webb was first stationed at **Johnson's Island** in **Sandusky Bay**, along with other Kelleys Island soldiers. (Added information will appear in [] .)*

Point of Rocks, Va.—June 28th, 1864, 7 o'C A.M.

Outside Intrenchments, On Picket

My Dear Wife & Children Sarah, Belle & Charlie,

Your letter of the 19th (No.8) reached me a half hour since. I am out as Captain of a detachment of the Picket Guard having relieved the old guard last night at 8 o'C. Our mail was brought from Camp to us this morning by **Wm. Kelley & H. Hayes**. I see by all the letters rec'd that you have heard nothing from us by letter since we left Washington, or had not up to date of 19th... You will (if you have not already) get a bag full of letters at the Island when they do get there.

During the Battles before Petersburg there was no communication with Washington, and our regular line of mail boats was only established a few days since. We are jogging along about the old style, only there are not so many men being moved back and forth as heretofore. I think there must be a letter of yours missing. I think the last I rec'd was No. 6 June 16th...

I cannot say how many I have written you since we arrived here, but have written very often... You will doubtless receive them all in due time. Since our Reg't returned from building the Fort on the James River near Malvern Hill of which I wrote you in my last, we have been on duty only in the night manning the Intrenchments from 8 o'C P.M. until daylight with the entire strength of the Reg't.

On Monday night the programme was changed. Three Co's of our Reg't man the Breastworks at night. One Company goes out on picket 24 hours (outside the Breastworks) and the other six Companies have the night in quarters. On Monday night this new arrangement took effect and three Co's including mine were ordered to the Breastworks and Co. E went out on picket. I took command of the entire Breastworks' force for the first half of the night. Capt. M of Co. G to

relieve me at 12 o'C. Just before my time was up there were some demonstrations on our front which looked suspicious. A new Rebel camp had established itself in plain sight from our Breastworks and the camp fires burned all along the lines. These camp fires were extinguished rather suddenly about 11 o'C and about 11 1/2 o'C, a single bright fire shone up for 20 minutes and was extinguished. At a little before 12 the sound of axes was plainly heard and of trees falling. Word was sent our Brigade Commandant, who came down, got on the Breastworks with me, obtained from me the range of the fires and heard the noise in our front. He told me to remain, that he would send me a force of 150 dismounted Cavalry to place in a gap in our lines, two companies of the 134th to be placed in another position, and 40 men to be placed in a Redan just in my front. (A Redan is a small entrenchment of logs and earth protected by a battis(sp?) outside of the Breastworks). That they would report to me and he would come himself with 800 men to be placed in reserve in the woods in our rear. He said he had no doubt but that I was correct in my supposition that the Rebs were building a battery either to shell us in the Breastworks or to protect a dash of their own upon us. The dispositions were made to receive them, and he left with the request that I would continue in charge until daylight which I did, nothing occurred during the night and we have as yet not heard from any Battery, though we may at any time.

Last evening I was ordered with 54 men to relieve the picket guard, so that brings me on two nights in succession, though last night I got some sleep. My health was never better, hardly ever as good through the hot weather as now, with the exception of my eyes. The dust and heat have affected them though they are doing well now.

Our boys would be glad to be on picket duty all the time, as we get out of the dust and heat of the camp and lie in the shade of the woods, only keeping a sharp lookout for the "Johnny Rebs," as they are called here. The duty is not dangerous either as Veterans hold the advanced lines of picket in exposed places. I say not dangerous, I mean comparatively not dangerous, and I have no fear that I shall lose one of my boys from any other than sickness or their own carelessness.

You may say to one and all that there is no danger of our being deliberately led into a fight. If attacked in our position, of course, we are here to hold those positions and will have to take our chances. Were it not for the heat I would much prefer to stay here the balance of our time than to be moved, and as long as we keep well, as at present, I shall hope we shall not be moved again until "moved" home. The heat is very oppressive during the day and the flies, of which there are myriads, are a most intolerable nuisance giving you no rest for a moment during the day so that sleep in the daytime in camp is merely impossible. Therefore we consider picketing as most welcome relief.

Our boys were pretty well up to the expedition to the James River and have pretty well recovered again. **Frank Kelley** was quite sick and has done no duty since but is getting along well. I make it a point to keep our sick away from

the Hospital if possible and am satisfied we have less sickness in consequence. **Wm. D. K.** had a very severe attack yesterday afternoon of cramping and griping of the bowels. I had nothing else at hand on the moment but some whiskey which I applied as a wash, **Mr. Worden** and myself rubbing his stomach and bowels briskly for a few moments and thus relieving him almost as if by magic. He was all right in an hour and this morning brought out our mail and coffee for breakfast. **H. Hayes** is head cook for the Co. and **John Wing** has charge of my cooking and c (that is my mess, including **Bristol, Lange, Erastus** and myself) and is thus relieved from all other duty. Let **Mrs. Wing** know this. He does not have to go on guard nor on fatigue duty, in fact is relieved from all duty except cooking.

Our mess fares hard for provisions as we, not being allowed to draw rations, have to buy them, and as but very little can be bought, we live very plain. I found that using coffee all the time would not answer especially as the coffee issued here is miserable stuff, so I quit using it and am using tea, but as no green tea can be obtained here at any price, I am using black tea. (You know how I abominated black tea when at home.) We have not since we arrived here had a single article for our table that you would have set before me at home, still I eat as much as I can get and am satisfied that my health is thus kept good. It astonishes me to find myself eating fat salt bacon, bread half sour all the time, and drinking black tea, with no milk and sweetened with brown sugar. No vegetables to be obtained, and up to yesterday nothing had been issued except Hard bread, Coffee, Pork and Bacon. Yesterday we had issued to the boys besides these, Rice, Sauerkraut, Molasses and a peck of Potatoes for 70 men. The officers you will remember cannot draw these but I had presented me from the Surgeons quarters a pail full of string beans. You know how fond I am of string beans and it happens that not one of my mess besides myself eats string beans at all, I gave them all to the boys. Mind I do not complain of my living as long as I am healthy, as at present, for I believe my good health is attributable to my light eating.

I weighed yesterday 123 lbs. We bought some pickles but had to throw them away. I got a few dried peaches and yesterday **John** found some dried apples and cooked a few for me just before I came out. Neither of my Lieutenants or **Erastus** are with me. The Orderly never goes on picket nor the Lieut's unless the Company, as a Company, are ordered out. The detail this time was for myself, 48 men, 2 Serg. and 4 Corporals. I have eight men from another Company. We are in "Confound" ignorance of Grant's movements, but only know that a small force is here now... I am seated on the edge of a Rifle pit under the shade of a shanty made of branches of trees uniting and keeping off the flies. **Jerry** is just behind me writing. **Oscar** and **Ohlemacher** are asleep at my right, and one of my Toledo boys is on guard. My company is occupying the Rifle Pits for a quarter of a mile each side of me writing, sleeping...in the shade. The music from a dozen bands reaches us from inside the Breastworks, all banging away at tunes that have become as familiar as household words. The boom of an occasional big gun from our works or the "Rebs" and the sharp crack of an Enfield rifle a way off at some point of our picket guard, serve as interludes to the lazy repose which we are just now enjoying. We are relieved at 8 o'clock P.M. today.

We will continue with this letter and others from the series in our next newsletter.
